Active Shooter Procedures

Run - If there is an accessible escape path, attempt to evacuate the premises. Have an escape route and plan in mind. Evacuate regardless of whether others agree to follow. Leave your belongings behind. Help others escape, if possible. Prevent individuals from entering an area where the active shooter may be. Follow the instructions of any police officers. Keep your hands visible. Do not attempt to move wounded people. Call 911 when you are safe.

Hide - If evacuation is not possible, find a place to hide where the active shooter is less likely to find you. Your hiding place should be out of the active shooter's view which provides protection if shots are fired in your direction (i.e., an office with a closed and locked door). It should prevent an active shooter from entering your hiding place. It should not trap you or restrict your options for movement. Lock the door. Blockade the door with heavy furniture. Silence your phone.

Fight - As a last resort, and only when your life is in imminent danger, attempt to disrupt and/or incapacitate the active shooter by acting as aggressively as possible against him/her.

Traveling to and from work each day we become complacent with our routine. What if the unexpected happens? How would you react if there was a report of an active shooter on base, or a hazardous materials release with a plume headed your way, or you find a suspicious package in your workplace?

Even though these situations are certainly not what you expect to encounter each day, it's best for you and your family to prepare now for the unexpected. Of vital importance is knowing how to react at a moments notice to protect yourself and others. Further, it is imperative to have a mental set of procedures to follow and practice those procedures to ensure everything works as planned. Once everyone in your family and those at your workplace have exercised the plan, be sure to adjust as necessary and if required, familiarize everyone once again. Here are a few tips to develop a good plan.

The Shelter In-Place program is designed to protect JB MDL personnel during an accident or emergency from a downwind hazard when an evacuation is not possible. Personnel will be alerted by one of the multiple notification systems on base to Shelter In-Place. Once notified, personnel will report to the Shelter In-Place room and run the checklist inside the Shelter In-Place kit. These procedures should be common knowledge and routinely exercised.

The definition of an active shooter is an individual actively engaged in shooting or attempting to shoot people. There may be no pattern or method to selection of their victims. Active Shooter incidents are often over within 15 minutes. Law Enforcement may not arrive on scene until the incident is over as building occupants must be ready to handle the situation both mentally and physically.

Know the difference between a suspicious item and an unattended item. A suspicious item may be anything from a vehicle to a package. When the item is discovered it is important not to touch, handle or examine the item. Contact emergency response personnel by calling 911 from at least 300 feet away if on a cell phone or radio. If an evacuation is required to take place, alert all personnel of the current situation. Evacuation procedures must be pre-determined for each facility. If the suspicious item contained a powdery substance, any personnel who may have come in contact with the material must be isolated from the remaining non-exposed evacuees.

Being prepared for the unexpected can help you, your co-workers and the ones you care for to be better equipped to handle emergency situations. It is important to practice emergency procedures to reduce confusion during an actual event. - Downwind Hazard
- Pre-designated area
- Accountability
- Establish communication (GCC/UCC/CP/JBCC)
- 2-3 hour duration

Evacuation

- Move up wind / up hill
- Primary and alternate location
- Sweep for suspicious items / call 911
- First aid/ Accountability

Notification

- Giant voice
- AtHoc Voice/Text
- AtHoc Desktop Alert
- JB MDL 1650 AM Radio Station
